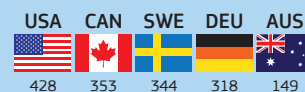

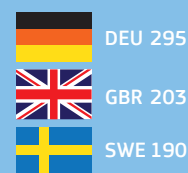

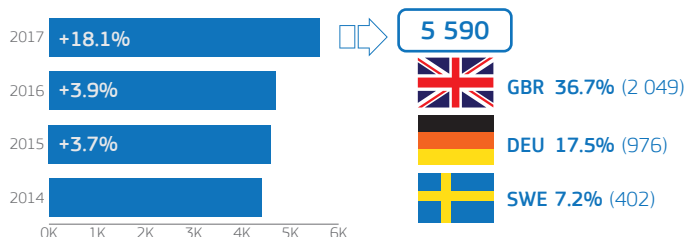

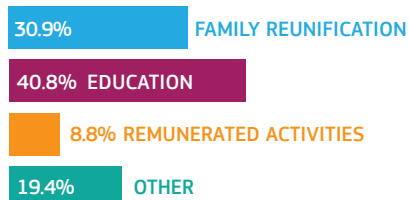

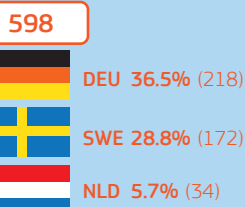

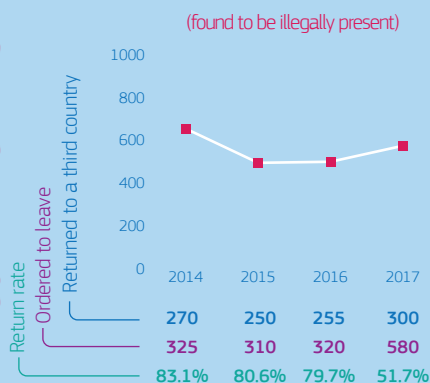

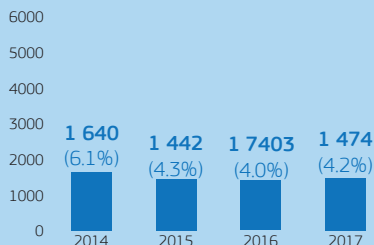

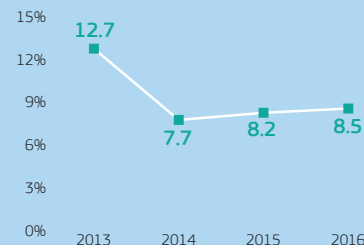

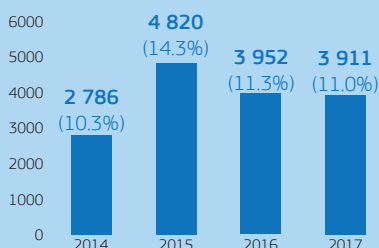
NET FDI Foreign Direct Investment



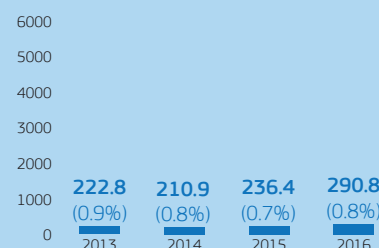
% EU institutions on all donors (total disbursed aid Humanitarian + ODA)

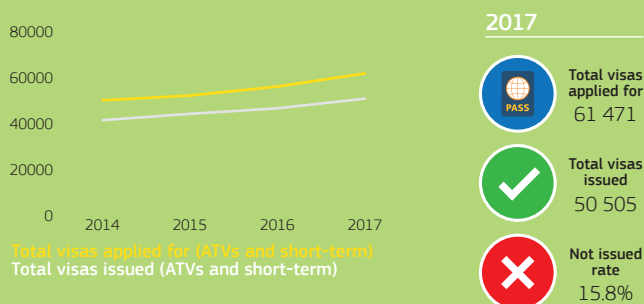
